The oldest GLBTQ+ organization in the State of Nevada, The Silver Dollar Court (SDC), donated \$22,000 to their charities for the year as the final event of the XLII reign of Emperor Jed Spendlove and Empress Savannah Jewel.

NYEP (Nevada Youth Empowerment Program) and Just In Hope Foundation were the charities for the year selected at Investitures the previous July.

"This was the culmination of a years worth of hard work by my Empress and myself," Emperor Jed Spendlove said in a facebook posting. "We presented our two wonderful charities with funds we raised. Congratulations to Nevada Youth Empowerment Project and Justin Hope Foundation.

Carson City didn't have a pride celebration four years ago. Now it has with Sassafras which is also being called Nevada Pride by organizers.

Northern Nevada Pride 2018 was easily the largest attended Pride event in the 31 year history of celebrations in the area. More than 12,000 people kept Wingfield Park, in the heart of downtown Reno, packed most of the day, July 28.

"It is great to see the diversity," a spokesperson for Northern Nevada Pride told therenogaypage. "Look at the families, the allies and GLBTQ+ community members that are here simply to have a good time and celebrate diversity."

The weekend events, all part of Reno's Artown month long celebration of Arts and Culture, started Friday Night with *The Art of Drag*, better known as *Drag Wars*, and ended with a pool party at the Grand Sierra. Not to mention all the activities at all the bars and the introduction of the Rainbow Pride Crawl.

"I can't believe how many people are here," Tim Hulak, Sparks, told therenogaypage, "I have been coming to this event since it started and this is the biggest non-stop crowd that I have seen."

Even organizers, who were expecting an increase in attendance, were amazed by the turnout.

"They just kept coming," Brian Jensen who is in charge of the festival grounds for Northern Nevada Pride said. "...There was a line down First Street before we opened the gates. This is amazing!"

"I think it makes a big difference too with just one Pride festival," Sandy Bennett, Reno, said. "When there were two, a couple of weeks apart, there was confusion and split attendance. We have one celebration of diversity and look at the turn out --WOW!"

The kick-off event for Northern Nevada Pride saw nearly 400 people attending the Harrah's Plaza event that features various contests between Drag Kings and Drag Queens. Jillian Helget and Meredith Tanzer came

Reno's Mayor Hillary Schieve, a longtime ally of the GLBTQ+ community in Reno, created a special award to honor citizenry who promote diversity, understand and awareness.

"Reno needed to step up," Mayor Schieve told therenogaypage. "So I created the *Rainbow R Awards* to do just that, honor those who

stand out in promoting a positive image and understanding in the Biggest Little City."

The Awards began at the Mayor's Pride Party in 2017. The event is also a fund raiser for OUR Center, The Silver Dollar Court and NALA (the Northern Nevada Leadership Alliance) held at FacesNV.

The Mayor says that people can submit a letter to her office telling why a person should be awarded a *Rainbow R Award*. From those letters the most deserving will presented the award at the party.

This year's recipients were Aaron Salazar, who was critically injured when somehow he left a train approaching Truckee. His mother An-

With her performance on the Amphitheater Pride Main Stage she took the crowd by surprise. There were loud cheers when she would do legs kicks, flips and somersaults.

"My plans for Aradia is to continue to grow her," She told therenogaypage. "I'm always watching and looking at drag queens, makeup, fashion,

hair, etc. on social media and always coming up with new costumes that I want to do with my dad! And we've come up with some cool stuff, so I'm excited to get creating!"

What is ahead of Aradia?

She hopes to move to Los Angeles after she finishes her next cruise ship contract. There she plans to pursue drag and continue to dance.

Her main goal is to pursue a position on RuPaul's Drag Race. She is targeting season 14 for that to happen.

"I would love for Aradia to continue, Drag has become a need, and a passion!" Aradia said.

But where did the name Aradia (A-rah-dee-a) come from?

She says she ran through lots of names before deciding on Aradia, who is the daughter of the Queen of Witches Diana and Lucifer from Italian lore.

"The name Aradia came a long way, going through many, many names. But it was my favorite, I liked how it sounded, and I thought, "This is going to become me". so I wanted to be called something I like, So Aradia it was!"

As the bike parade enters the festival grounds, the festival gets underway. Each year participation in the parade and festival grows.

"People come out and support," Whitney said in an interview on KNVC-LP. "We want to bring people from Reno, Las Vegas, the Lake, from everywhere to Carson to celebrate Pride in the state's capital."

There were 39 vendors occupying the space in the Sassafras parking lot.

"This is the largest number of vendors we have ever had," Jayme Watt said. "We had the Mayor of Carson Bob Crowell and Reno's Mayor Hillary Schieve spoke to open the festival on the outdoor stage. Sassabration also has an inside stage in the restaurant.

We have all kinds of people attend," Jayme Watt said. "Parents come out to support their kids, friends come out to support their friends, Everyone has a great time."

With two stages music was non stop from Noon til after 9 pm. Carson Hot Springs also offered free admission from Noon to 6 pm during the festival.

The Aces will be making a donation to OUR Center following the event.


Fundraiser set for Carls

"That year we made it a "green" pride parade because insurance for motorized vehicles was so expensive," one of the Build Our Center Board member said. "The parade was small and short but we had a parade - Now look at it!"

The last five years, Meredith Tanzer, who coordinated the first CommUNITY Pride Parade in 2010, and Jillian Helget were the parade directors.

"There is something about a parade on Virginia Street," Ms. Helget told therenogaypage, "that brings people out to watch."

The two spent much of the morning on the corner of Fourth and North Virginia checking in the 62 contingents.

Among the entries this year were many politicians, as it is an election year, along

The Festival

There were lines for food and beverages most of the day as the crowd moved through the vendor areas, watched entertainment, and milled about the festival grounds.

Food trucks at the Pride were: *Nom Eats*, *Bam Dogs*, *Stix and Strips*, *Paisan Old World Italian*, *Snack Shack*, *Koko Teriyaki*, *Smuggle*, *Mari Chuy's*, *Super Swirl* and *Rub Shack*. Beer and water were sold by the Festival.

Brain Jensen and Josh Grace are responsible for the Festival and Vendors. This year sold out of all 125 spaces they had available. There were vendors carrying ever type of "Rainbow" gear a person would want, to businesses introducing them selves to the GLBTQ+ community, banks, churches and political candidates and initiatives. Jensen could be seen most of the day running around and assisting vendors with their needs.

Joel Piexoto and Michael Brazier handled the Volunteers, the team that does the lifting, carrying, assisting, gate keepers, and anything else needed to make the festival run smoothly. Over 100 volunteers signed up for four hour shifts, giving back to the community and getting a Volunteer t-shirt.

Monique Monzo, director of entertainment out did

herself in putting together a stage line-up for 7 hours on the Amphitheater Stage. Northern Nevada Pride has tryouts for entertainers. This year three acts tried out . Ms. Manzo did what was done the first ever Reno Gay Pride and went to friends and friends of friends to find entertainers.

"I love the drag queens," Samantha Jordon, North Valleys, who sat in front of the stage most of the day, told therenogaypage. "The entertainment this year has been great. I don't want it to end."

A surprise was a baby drag queen taking to the stage the very first time, Aradia (read the story on page 1). A professional dancer, Aradia brought the crowd to their feet shocking her by the reaction the crowd had.

"You are going to have to watch this one!" Stephanie Nicile LeDream told the audience. "This one is going places"

Ms. LeDream hosted the stage entertainment for the fifth year and brought the house down with two of her numbers. She annually has brought children to the stage during one of the numbers, this year filling the stage. Her final number was a version of "Rise" that was timely, thoughtful and touching. The number brought tears to Meredith Tanzer's eyes. Ms. LeDream touched on the struggles of the GLBTQ+ community, Black Lives Matter and other social issues during the number.

the whole event is marketing and getting people to turn out to the event. YeVonne Allen, has been the marking director from the beginning when Northern Nevada Pride was simply "The Pegasus Project". She manages the social media, advertising, creates posters, and anything else required to turn out a crowd to the fund raiser for OUR Center.

Ms. Allen, on a small budget, creates the cards to promote Pride, puts together the Pride Guide, handles media relations and what give always will be available along with what the Pride t-shirt will look like for the year. Then during the three month prior you will find her and Pride promotional materials literally everywhere a potential visitor to the parade, festival or Drag Wars can be found. She is one of the reasons for the success of Northern Nevada Pride.

The chairman of Northern Nevada Pride is OUR Center President Jeremy Manke, who has been on the OUR Center board since 2010. He supervises all the activities and coordinates all the committee for Pride. It has been said he has to be a mediator when discussions come up and get heated. But all is worked out in the end.

It does take a village to make Northern Nevada Pride happen. Besides those already mention on the committee are Brett Whalen, who assisted with the parade; Todd Eikelberger, administration and logistics; Brittney Nielsen, entertainment and Bill Nelson, IT.

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
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
